Intersectional Gendered Impacts of COVID-19

ABSTRACT

COVID-19 has disproportionately impacted women and exacerbated gender inequality. The majority of workers directly impacted and at a higher risk of contracting COVID-19 are women. The employment rate decline throughout the COVID-19 period was predominantly women. Women are dropping out of the workforce at higher rates due to COVID-19 caregiving responsibilities, home-schooling requirements and sanitation and cleaning needs - all of which are further reinforced by the gender pay gap, societal expectations and our gendered employment sectors. As we prepare for schools to re-open in the Fall and the second wave of COVID-19 to start, we need to examine the shortfalls and barriers of our current system and policies and create changes now to advance equality.

Marcie is the founder of Canadian Equality Consulting; an Alberta-based company that supports workplaces to become leaders in gender equity, diversity and inclusion. Marcie has a Master's degree in international relations from the Maxwell School at Syracuse University in New York focused on conflict resolution, a Bachelor (Hons) degree in Political Studies, and extensive experience in gender analysis, gender mainstreaming, diversity and inclusion, policy and program development, and stakeholder engagement.
